Awards and Honors



Pam Green '72 was inducted into the Country Radio Hall of Fame on July 10, 2023. The Country Radio Hall of Fame is dedicated to the recognition of individuals who have made significant contributions to the radio industry over a 20-year period.

Pam began her career at the iconic WHN/New York in the early '70s, where she quickly ascended to the position of music director. She continued to make waves in the industry, serving as senior director of artist relations for United Stations Radio Networks, later becoming Westwood One. Her contributions to the industry were recognized when she was named one of country Radio's Greatest Music Directors by Radio & Records Magazine. Pam's success as one of country radio's first female music directors paved the way for other women seeking influential programming positions.

In her acceptance speech, she recognized Stephens for its "terrific theatre program." She told the story of how she fell in love with New York City when she took a study trip with the Searcy House Plan her freshman year, which led her to move to the Big Apple after graduation and to embark on a 45+ year radio career. She said, "While there will not be a Tony award in my future, tonight I'm celebrating a much more important award, induction into the Country Radio Hall of Fame." For more click here.





In Memoriam: Honoring the Lives and Legacies of Our Departed Stephens Family



Mary Alice "Patti" Doyle passed away on November 29, 2023, in Columbia, MO. She was born on February 19, 1938. Patti earned an MA in Theatre Arts from Northwestern University in Evanston, IL, and a PhB in Theatre Arts from the University of Detroit. She served as the costume design professor at Stephens College for 34 years. At Stephens, she taught 20th Century Costume History in the fashion department and Costume Construction and Costume Design in the performing arts department. After her retirement in 2009, Patti returned as a guest costume designer for the Okoboji Summer Theater in 2012.


After retirement, Patti taught courses at the University of Missouri OSHER Life Long Learning Center, traveled to China, enjoyed a Rhine River cruise, and took yearly trips to Stratford, Ontario, for the Shakespeare Festival. She had a lifelong love for research and amassed over 1500 books in her theater, art, fashion, and history library. She was active in the community of Columbia through the Weavers and Spinners Guild, the Symphony Society, and the Assistance League of Mid-Missouri. Music was her passion, including jazz, musical theatre, and especially the theatre organ. She traveled regularly to Kansas City, attending many organ concerts. Patti continued her artistic endeavors, creating miniature works and producing beadwork and jewelry for sale at Artrageous Gallery. In her words: "Who said retirement was boring?"

Patti's celebration of life was held at the Macklanburg Playhouse on January 20, 2024, with displays of her many creative works. Patti wished that expressions of sympathy be made to the Okoboji Summer Theater.









Actor-teacher-mentor Addison Michael Myers passed away at 92 on December 23, 2023, in Columbia, MO. Addison entertained numerous audiences and mentored hundreds of students in his career. He directed the theatre program at Hollywood High School in Los Angeles, CA, from 1964- 1968. Joining the Stephens College faculty in 1968 as a professional actor/teacher, Addison taught acting, directing, and theatre history from 1968-1974 and from 1976 until his retirement in 1998. For nearly 50 years, Addison was active in summer stock productions at such venues as the Sharon Playhouse in Sharon, CT, the Canterbury Theatre in Michigan City, IN, and at the Okoboji

Summer Theatre in Iowa, where he served as managing/artistic director from the early 1980s through 1997.

Addison was a proud member of the Actor's Equity Association and SAG-AFTRA. He performed in more than 300 plays as an actor and director, appearing on- and off-Broadway, on television, and in film. His credits range from a 1957 Broadway Company production of Inherit the Wind to an episode of the Twilight Zone to Westlake Hardware commercials. Before and after retirement from Stephens College, Addison maintained an active career in movies, industrial films, commercials, voice-overs, and print in Kansas City and St. Louis. Locally, he performed in several productions of the Greenhouse Theatre Project and at Talking Horse Productions. His last performance was with his close friend Aaron Krawitz in Memoirs at Talking Horse in 2017.

Addison is survived by his wife of 42 years, **Darcy Wells '87,** whom he met in Spirit Lake, IA, in 1981. He is also survived by daughter Alison Brunet and grandsons Nick and Jake Brunet of Arizona, in-laws from Iowa, Minnesota, and Washington, niece Suzanne Hilty Lind of Michigan, nephew George Myers Jr. of Texas, and other nieces and nephews from around the U.S.

Memorial contributions may be directed to the Okoboji Summer Theatre or the Central Missouri Humane Society. A celebration of life will be held on Saturday, April 13, 2024, at 2 p.m. in the Macklanburg Playhouse on the Stephens College campus.

Stop Day: Class Giving Challenges

In 1914, on April 1, President James Madison Wood called for a campus-wide Stop Day. Excerpts from the 1914 Stephensophia describe what occurred on that eventful day:

"All was peace until the first of April when there was rumor of a class uprising."

"All year long, the over-enthusiastic Juniors had been trying to 'start something' (as they expressed it) and wondered why the Seniors didn't respond. But the time was coming when they would no longer accuse the dignified Seniors of having no "class spirit". April 1 was declared a holiday. At 1:30, a Faculty-student baseball game was played in the gym. Of course, all the unsuspecting Juniors were at the game, but three alert Seniors were at that very time bearing the loved "crimson and green" high above all, upon the utmost tower. Then, behold! What did the astonished Juniors see waving gaily in the breeze when they came from the game? Senior colors! It never occurred to them that this might be an April Fool joke - merely intended to arouse excitement..."







This tomfoolery launched a tradition of a week-long 'battle' between the Junior and Senior classes.

It is not clear who won in 1914. On page 21 of the 1914 Stephensophia, the Juniors declared themselves the victors. However, on page 22 the seniors say, "Of course these are only rumors, for the Seniors were not eyewitnesses to these heart-rending scenes."
